With over 29 years' experience, Greer Johnson Gillis is an innovative transportation executive who has been focused on organizational change through 21st century multi-modal initiatives.

Mrs. Gillis currently serves as Senior Vice President – Chief Infrastructure & Development Officer Programs for the Jacksonville Transportation Authority (JTA). At the JTA, Mrs. Gillis oversees the System Development Division and is responsible for the following departments: Automation & Innovation; Construction & Engineering; Planning & Sustainability; Facilities Management & Transit Amenities; Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Belonging; and the Capital Projects Office.

Mrs. Gillis joined the JTA in April 2020. In her first months at the JTA, Mrs. Gillis established the JTA's Sustainability Program Office to elevate the Authority's action on sustainability initiatives and programs, and the JTA's Capital Project Office to focus on efficient project and program management delivery. She oversees the MobilityWorks 2.0 program, funded by the local option gas tax proceeds approved by the Jacksonville City Council in 2021. As part of this program, the JTA is responsible for half a billion dollars in transit and complete streets projects to support infrastructure investments throughout Duval County.

She has served as Commissioner on the Public Service Commission of the District of Columbia (Washington, DC), Director of the DC Department of General Services and in several executive positions at the District Department of Transportation in Washington, DC. Her private industry experience culminated with her position as Area Manager for the Washington, DC office of Parsons Brinckerhoff, Inc. (now WSP), one of the premier engineering firms.

In 2014, Mrs. Gillis was honored by President Obama and U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx as a **White House Champion of Change: Transportation Ladders of Opportunity** for her efforts in expanding diversity in the engineering industry.

Mrs. Gillis holds a Bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering and a Master of Science degree in Civil Engineering with a concentration in Transportation, both from the Georgia Institute of Technology. She is a licensed Professional Engineer in Washington, DC, and Virginia. She is married to Robert Gillis, a network engineer, and together they provide in-home care for their elderly mothers and active play time for their two rescue dogs Maui & Malo.

Eulois Cleckley serves as the Director and CEO of the Department of Transportation and Public Works for Miami-Dade County. As Director and CEO, Cleckley oversees the 15th largest public transit system in the country and the largest transit agency in the State of Florida. With approximately 4,000 employees, DTPW is one of the largest departments in Miami-Dade County government serving a population of 2.8 million residents.

Cleckley was the previous Executive Director of the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure (DOTI) for the City and County of Denver. Cleckley led the creation of DOTI, and as Executive Director, he ran one of the city's largest and most dynamic departments focused on modernizing Denver's transportation system, constructing public facilities, maintaining sanitary and sewer systems and providing solid waste removal, recycling and composting services.

Cleckley previously worked for the Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC), where he served as the Deputy Director of the Metropolitan Planning Organization which covers the eight-county Houston-Galveston region and provided overall strategic direction related to city and regional transportation planning, project development and implementation.

Prior to his work with the HGAC, Cleckley served as Chief of Statewide and Regional Planning, and later acting Chief of the Field Operations Division, for Washington, D.C.'s District Department of Transportation (DDOT). His previous experience includes private consulting for local and state governments and working as a transportation specialist at the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) and serving as the founder and CEO of a non-profit organization focused on community and business engagement.

In June 2020, Cleckley was unanimously elected to serve as President for the Colorado Chapter of the Conference of Minority Transportation Officials (COMTO), a national not-for-profit organization founded in 1971 and established to provide a forum for minority professionals in the transportation industry.

Mr. Cleckley has Transportation and Economics degrees from North Carolina A&T State University and a Global Logistics Specialist Professional Designation from California State University. He served as the President of the National Association of City Transportation Officials (NACTO) and is a member of the Transportation Research Board (TRB).

Adam is the CEO of Infrastructure Strategies, consulting with public and private sector clients on the planning and delivery of major infrastructure projects and programs.

Adam served the City and County of Denver from 2016 to 2024, most recently as the Executive Director of Denver's Department of Transportation & Infrastructure (DOTI) - one of the city's largest departments in one of the fastest growing cities in the U.S. - responsible for building out a modern transportation network that is accessible for all users and re-envisioning a cleaner, more sustainable public works system paired with a greater investment in public facilities.

DOTI's commitment to offering multimodal transportation options reduces vehicle congestion and supports the city's efforts to address climate change. DOTI also plans, designs, builds and delivers the city's stormwater and bridge infrastructure and operates, maintains, regulates and enforces other elements within the public right of way, including providing trash, recycling and compost collection services.

As Executive Director, Adam managed approximately 1,600 DOTI employees and oversaw the department's >\$350 million annual operating budget and >\$4 billion citywide capital program. In this role, Adam navigated the challenges of meeting the ever-increasing demands of building new capital infrastructure while also steering DOTI to become the ideal capital delivery program.

Adam managed the Elevate Denver Bond Program, Denver's largest General Obligation Bond program to date with an emphasis on major projects including Colorado Convention Center Expansion, 16th Street Mall Renovation, Colfax BRT implementation, the Urban Waterways Restoration Study and the National Western Center.

Adam began his career in the construction industry as a Project Manager for one of Denver's WBE Architectural/Engineering firms, providing engineering consulting services on a wide range of projects for federal agencies, state facilities, local municipalities, and private entities. In 2014, Adam joined the National Renewable Energy Laboratory providing technical oversight and subject matter expertise for the Project Management, Engineering and Construction Group.

Adam is a licensed Professional Engineer and certified Project Management Professional and is a Colorado native with a B.S. degree in Engineering from the Colorado School of Mines.
