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# **Policy Referral Summary**

### Background

- In early 2022, Council restored criminal enforcement as an option for violation of certain city ordinances
- Based on recent community feedback, Council needs to review concerns associated with ordinance enforcement, and assess other strategies available to serve Charlotte's unhoused population and address perceived safety and quality of life concerns

### Policy Question

- What effective strategies can the city employ to collaborate with Mecklenburg County, United Way, and Charlotte Center City Partners to holistically address perceived safety concerns in Center City and surrounding areas?
  - 1. What are community concerns and feedback related to our unhoused population?
  - 2. Are there updates or revisions to the City Code of Ordinances that are currently enforced only by civil penalties, but legally have the option for criminal enforcement that should be considered to better help our neighborhoods and businesses across the city to thrive?
  - 3. How can these strategies take into account the needs of our unhoused population while optimizing public safety resources?

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

## **Policy Referral Summary**

## Committee Charge

- Conduct a comprehensive review, including a listening session for residents, business owners, and/or non-profit organizations, of the existing concerns, calls for service data, and available resources
- Work with Charlotte Center City Partners, United Way, Housing & Neighborhood Services Department, CMPD, City Attorney's Office, and Mecklenburg County to examine the impact of potential solutions on the unhoused population, the allocation of public safety resources, and service providers
- Propose for consideration of full City Council any recommended strategies and/or revisions to the City Code that would align with the concerns and best interests of the various stakeholders

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# **Public Listening Session**


## Background

- Listening session held September 27th, open to the public
- Approximately 90 guests attended the session: primarily uptown residents, with some representation from local business community and non-profit sector
- Format include facilitated table discussions with table report-outs to conclude the session

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- 1. Vast majority of residents at the session support the restoration of criminal penalties for certain ordinances, but also believe that holistic solutions (including supportive services) are necessary to address root causes
- 2. General perception that safety conditions have worsened in past few years
- 3. Safety concerns among residents are typically very specific to geography and time of day
- 4. Recognition that illegal/indecent behaviors are committed by both housed and unhoused residents
- 5. Based on a survey (conducted by Hearts for the Invisible, Roof Above and Salvation Army) of 25 unhoused residents, a need exists for greater access to public restrooms (i.e., more restrooms, and restrooms that are open 24/7)

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## CMPD Ordinance Enforcement Changes

- Compliance
- Verbal warning
- Written civil citation --- usually \$50 for the offense
  - Not written often as citing a civil penalty to a subject in crisis or addiction goes unpaid
  - Observed unchanged behavior

## Benefits:

- Compliance
- Additional tool on the toolbelt
- Deterrent
- Behavior changer



## **CMPD Ordinance Enforcement Data**

### Background

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- More context provided regarding certain service call, citation and arrest charge data.
- Data that follows was queried based on charge or call descriptions.

## ⊲ Key Themes

- Call totals trended down over the last five years jurisdiction wide and in Central Division
  - Call types including public intoxication, indecent exposure, loitering for money, loitering alcohol and public urination
- Increase in homeless calls for service over the last two years jurisdiction wide and in Central Division
- Citation totals trended down over the last five years jurisdiction wide. Division-level data unavailable.
- Arrests for the selected charge types trended down, with exception of public indecent exposure/public sex act





## 1. Today

- a. Committee discussion and feedback on all items presented
- b. Committee decision whether to recommend criminal enforcement for certain ordinances at this time, leading to a required two-step process:
  - 1. Introduce proposed amendments at one Council meeting
  - 2. Council adoption of specific criminal enforcement language at a subsequent meeting

### 2. Near-Term Next Steps

- a. Continue to integrate this work with various other initiatives, such as Quality of Life Team and Economic Development Department stakeholder engagement
- b. Work with local stakeholders such as Charlotte Center City Partners, Hearts for the Invisible, Mecklenburg County, Roof Above, and United Way – to identify <u>non-enforcement strategies</u> that are responsive to the Policy Questions and Committee Charge reflected in the referral
- c. Share recommendations with Housing, Safety and Community Committee in January-February 2024 timeframe
