State Transportation Funding

- Transfer of State General Fund revenues to Transportation funds will keep critical projects moving
- When fully phased-in by FY 2025, \$643 million per year more for Transportation





Stowe Regional Water Resource Facility

- Groundbreaking in June 2023
- \$380 million project
- Meets growing population needs of Mecklenburg County
- Consolidates wastewater treatment of Towns and Mount Holly and Belmont
- Commissioning in 2026









- City supports legislation that enables CMPD to redeploy law enforcement officers to areas of highest and best use
- House Bill 140 (Rep. Faircloth) and Senate Bill 251 (Sen. Lazzara) authorize local police departments to hire trained civilians to investigate non-lethal traffic accidents
- Partnering with NC Association of Chiefs of Police, NC League of Municipalities and others





Affordable Housing – Homestead Tax Exemption City supports programs that enable older adults to age-in-place

City supports legislation that increases thresholds used to determine eligibility for the Homestead Tax Exemption program

Partnering with Mecklenburg County, Charlotte Regional Business Alliance, REBIC, and others

Infrastructure – Powell Bill

City supports the data-driven programs that distribute State transportation funding for airport improvements, transit maintenance assistance, and local road maintenance

Over the last three years, the city's Powell Bill allocation for local road maintenance has been set at 2/3 of the FY 2020 allocation resulting in loss of \$7 million to \$9 million per year for the City's Powell Bill Fund

Limitations in funding will lead to longer periods between street repaving and maintenance resulting in more potholes, cracking, ruts, heaved areas, utility cuts, etc.



Mobility

Our region is growing rapidly, but we are faced with challenges around mobility, equity, access to opportunity, housing, and sustainability

Our vision is based on opportunity, and we want to ensure that our residents have a good quality of life and opportunities for economic mobility

We need to address these issues with a comprehensive approach that involves crossjurisdictional collaboration and considers our key partnerships in the County and the Region

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Mobility

Continue to work with regional stakeholders and the General Assembly to secure mobility legislation that:

Enables the voters of Mecklenburg County to authorize the Mecklenburg County Commission to levy dedicated, stable, and permanent sources of revenues for regional and local roadway, bicycle, pedestrian, greenway, and public transportation systems

Enables local governments to issue revenue bonds for roadway, bicycle, pedestrian, greenway, and public transportation systems projects that would be backed by new and existing local sources of revenue



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
