FFTC and the ASC began a dialogue in February 2024 at the request of civic leaders. Since 1958, ASC has been an anotic mittibusion locally. This memorandmentabilis the benefits of a potential collaboration between the ASC and FFTC for the distribution of significantly increased arts funding from the City of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County, with a continued and enhanced focus on equity.

The ASC and FFTC recently began discussing the upcoming sunset of the Arts Infusion Fund (which will occur in June 2024), as well as the recommendations of the City of Charlotte Arts at Cultural Flan, published by the Arts Advisory Board overseeing the fund. The following observations provided much of the foundation for our discussion:

- The Cultural Plan called for a funding partnership between the City and County v increased annual appropriations from each to advance the cultural sector.


The private sector has begun adopting this recommendation - one campaign is underway an several others are in the planning stage. As mentioned, the Art Influsion Fund sunsets in June 2024. While these private sector approaches to support the arts will build over time, it was thought the Influsion Fund might be replaced by public sector annual funding beginning this upcoming fistor) year.

Although the Cultural Plan did not address using a single cultural umbeella organization to supervise the distribution of public dollars, we understand from community leaders and the ASC that using a single organization would support and coordinate both City and Country activities with those of the private sector, and provide leadership to guide the

May 2024 memo outlined several points

- Collaboration allows both organizations to focus on core functions:
 - ASC build upon tradition of grantmaking expertise
 - FFTC leverage robust administrative infrastructure to mitigate operating costs
- Restructure ASC Board and staff to become a legally affiliated supporting organization of FFTC
- New governance proposed to include participation from City, County, and cultural leaders
- June 2024 new supporting organization, the Arts, Science and Cultural Council (ASCC) incorporated under the FFTC


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


Role of the ASCC Governing Board
