

Department Review Process for Historic Landmark Designation

Findings: The Department Review Process did not reveal any conflicts concerning the designation of the properties.

Comment Summary

1. Charlotte Department of Transportation – The adopted Charlotte Streets Map [<https://charlotte.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.html?id=07aa32663a3e4a84aab2d2c434b1d09e>] shows the future cross-section of Queens Rd as a 4+ Blvd with buffered/separated bike lanes. CDOT would want the historic designation to not preclude adding the bike lanes in the future.
2. Charlotte Historic District Commission – No Comments.
3. Charlotte Housing and Neighborhood Services – Overall, no comments. Additionally, Housing and Neighborhood Services (HNS) supports and recommends equitable community engagement that actively and intentionally engages stakeholders and interested parties, especially when there are decisions to be made that external stakeholders can affect. The referenced property is within Charlotte City Council District 6.
