



Multi-way Stops



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
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#### **Traffic Calming in Charlotte**

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#### **Petition Process in Peer Cities**

City	Community Process
Austin*	Proactive program
Baltimore*	Community input based, opposition only
Richmond*	Fire and Council Representative engage neighborhood
Seattle*	Neighborhood Matching Grant or self-funding
Raleigh	Initial ballot, public comment and design periods, final ballot
El Paso	Petition (66% abutting parcels support)
San Francisco	Majority ballot
Atlanta*	Council Representative led and funded

<sup>\*</sup>no petition process required

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## **Recommended Policy Changes**

Remove petition requirement

Implement opposition only process

- Postcards to impact area
- Allow 45 days for opposition
- Appeal process already established
