Policy Referral Summary

◀ Policy Question

- What effective strategies can the city employ to collaborate with Mecklenburg County, United Way, and Charlotte Center City Partners to holistically address perceived safety concerns in Center City and surrounding areas?
 1. What are community concerns and feedback related to our unhoused population?
 2. Are there updates or revisions to the City Code of Ordinances that are currently enforced only by civil penalties, but legally have the option for criminal enforcement that should be considered to better help our neighborhoods and businesses across the city to thrive?
 3. How can these strategies take into account the needs of our unhoused population while optimizing public safety resources?

◀ Committee Charge

- Conduct a comprehensive review, including a listening session for residents, business owners, and/or non-profit organizations, of the existing concerns, calls for service data, and available resources
- Work with Charlotte Center City Partners, United Way, Housing & Neighborhood Services Department, CMPD, City Attorney's Office, and Mecklenburg County to examine the impact of potential solutions on the unhoused population, the allocation of public safety resources, and service providers
- Propose for consideration of full City Council any recommended strategies and/or revisions to the City Code that would align with the concerns and best interests of the various stakeholders

Summary of October 2, 2023 Committee Meeting

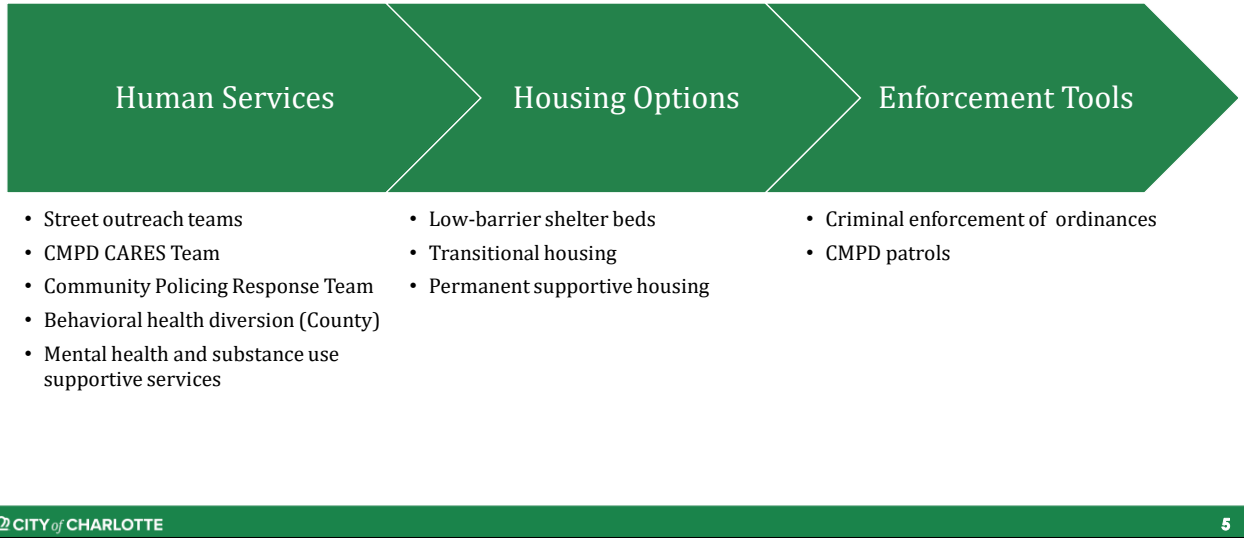
◀ The Committee discussed:

- NC General Assembly Session Law 2021-138 (enacted in September 2021)
- Council action in 2022 to restore criminal enforcement for certain ordinances
- CMPD's ordinance enforcement approach in recent years
- Mayor Lyles' August 2023 policy referral (reflecting emphasis on enforcement and non-enforcement tools)
- Key themes from the September 27, 2023 public listening session
- A short list of ordinances of relevance to the policy referral

◀ The Committee unanimously passed a motion calling for staff to return to Committee with:

1. The comprehensive list of ordinances to consider for reinstatement of criminal enforcement
2. Additional historical data and analysis (as applicable)

CMPD Ordinance Enforcement

In March and April of 2022, Council restored criminal enforcement as an option for certain city ordinances, as summarized in the table below

Chapter	Criminal Fines and Enforcement Reinstated
Chapter 4 - Aviation	- Commercial Use Permits - Ground Transportation
Chapter 6 - Businesses and Trades	- Dancehalls
Chapter 10 - Health and Sanitation	- Public Health Nuisances
Chapter 14 - Motor Vehicles and Traffic	- Playing or Loitering about Railroad Property
Chapter 15 - Offenses and Miscellaneous Provisions	- Camping (public property) - Carnivals - Kindling Bonfires - Noise - Shooting (city limits) - State of Emergency - Weapons (city property) - Youth Protection

CMPD Ordinance Enforcement Prior to 2021

◀ Enforcement took place through:

- Compliance
- Verbal warning
- Written citation
- Arrest



CMPD Ordinance Enforcement Changes

◁ Enforcement after ordinances were de-criminalized:

- Compliance
- Verbal warning
- Written civil citation --- usually \$50 for the offense
 - *Not written often as citing a civil penalty to a subject in crisis or addiction goes unpaid*
 - *Observed unchanged behavior*

City Ordinance Criminal Enforcement

◁ Benefits:

- Compliance
- Additional tool on the toolbelt
- Deterrent
- Behavior changer

Status of Non-Enforcement Strategies

◀ Current activity

- Contracting with Hearts for the Invisible to establish a street outreach team devoted primarily to Center City
- Establishing rental subsidies and supportive services for ten clients referred from the Center City unhoused population

◀ Future activity

- Evaluating FY 2025 co-investment with Mecklenburg County in support of a hotel/motel conversion to create a low-barrier, non-congregate shelter targeting the unhoused population (and offering specialized services for those with severe mental illness and/or addiction)
- Evaluating broader FY 2025 investments in A Home for All, with an emphasis on homelessness prevention measures
- Efforts underway to review city-owned physical infrastructure in the right-of-way, including bus shelters, benches, trash cans and magazine racks

Discussion and Potential Next Steps

- 1. Committee decision whether to recommend criminal enforcement for certain ordinances (as reflected on slide 11) at this time**
- 2. If Committee chooses to advance certain ordinances to Council, this will entail a two-step process (as required by state law):**
 - 1. Introduce proposed amendments at a future business meeting*
 - 2. Council adoption of specific criminal enforcement language at a subsequent business meeting*

CMPD Ordinance Enforcement Data

< Background

- More context provided regarding certain service call, citation and arrest charge data.
- Data that follows was queried based on charge or call descriptions.

< Key Themes

- Call totals trended down over the last five years jurisdiction wide and in Central Division
 - *Call types including public intoxication, indecent exposure, loitering for money, loitering – alcohol and public urination*
- Increase in homeless calls for service over the last two years jurisdiction wide and in Central Division
- Citation totals trended down over the last five years jurisdiction wide. Division-level data unavailable.
- Arrests for the selected charge types trended down, with exception of public indecent exposure/public sex act
