



# **Four Key Policy Elements**

- 1. School Eligibility
- 2. School Zone and School Speed Zone Placement
- 3. School Speed Limits
- 4. School Crossing Evaluation



# 1. School Eligibility

#### **Existing**

All public, charter, and private schools with at least 200 students, K-12

Conditional requirements for High Schools with six lanes or more, frontage of street with speed limit greater than 35 mph, and 40 or more student walkers

#### **Proposed**

All public, charter, and private schools with at least 200 students, K-12

Remove conditional requirements for high schools





## 2. School Zone and School Speed Zone

#### **Existing**

School zones and school speed zones are allowed on frontage streets only.

### **Proposed**

School zones and school speed zones are allowed on frontage and adjacent streets.





# 3. School Speed Limit

### **Existing**

25 miles per hour on City-Maintained streets

Case-by-case on State-Maintained streets

## **Proposed**

No change





# 4. Evaluation of School Crossing

#### **Existing**

Point system weighted towards total number of student walkers (minimum of 5 student walkers required)

### **Proposed**

**Location on High Injury Network corridor** 

Point system weighted towards traffic volume and operating speeds.
