


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

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CRIME REDUCTION UNITS

- All 13 patrol divisions have a dedicated Crime Reduction Unit
- These specialty units are charged with preventing crime and addressing violent crime trends.
- In 2020, collectively, the department's 13 CRUs
 - Recovered 467 illegal guns from the streets of our community
 - Made 1,620 arrests



CRIME STOPPERS

- As hard as our officers and detectives worked in 2020, community cooperation played an enormous role in public safety in 2020.
- It was a historic year for the number of calls community members made to provide tips through Crime Stoppers.








NIBIN

The National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) program

- CMPD added resources to Crime Lab and expanded NIBIN
 - A ballistic database run by the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF).
 - Tracks the ballistics of guns used in crimes from across the country and facilitates sharing of information between law enforcement groups.
 - Results in rapidly tracking gun-specific information and connection of a particular firearm to multiple crimes, regardless of locations.
 - Program expansion allows for firearms testing while entering fired casings from scenes.
- Results:
 - 575 investigative leads were generated through NIBIN last year
 - 517 of those leads involved casings from SIODs

ORGANIZED CRIME TASK FORCE

The Organized Crime Task Force (OCTF) is in partnership with the U.S. Secret Service and investigates organized crime and financial crimes.

Results from Aug. 1, 2019, through October 2020:

- 21 arrests including 13 federal indictments
- 9 search warrants of residences and/or businesses

Highlights regarding violent crime:

- 3 violent career criminals arrested and indicted for using stolen identities to purchase, rent and use firearms at local gun ranges.
- Gang investigation with subjects financing drug operations with auto and personal loan fraud.



MUISANCE ABATEMENT

CMPD will continue to work with other stakeholders in the Nuisance Enforcement Strategy Team (NEST) to strategically leverage nuisance abatement against the owners of property who have historical high crime and fall within the geographical areas of the corridors of opportunity.

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SAFE STREETS TASK FORCE

- Under our partnership with the FBI, the Safe Streets Task Force, the CMPD filed federal charges on more than 14 suspects in 2020
 - Some of those charges included: Trafficking Cocaine, Methamphetamine, and Heroin, Conspiracy to Traffic Narcotics, Firearm by Felon
- 19 illegal guns and one flamethrower were recovered in 2020 by the task force
- \$300,000 dollars worth of illegal street narcotics were seized by Safe Streets Task Force in 2020



MUMAN TRAFFICKING TASK FORCE

- The CMPD's Human Trafficking Task Force worked tirelessly in 2020 to protect some of the most vulnerable members of our community.
- They charged eleven suspects last year and all of those suspects are currently awaiting federal trial.
- The Task Force also worked to divert fourteen victims out of human trafficking.
- All of those victims were children.

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
CORE STAT BRIEFINGS

Under Core Stat briefings with CMPD command staff divisions, community leaders are invited to participate in weekly forums to discuss how each of the Core 4 principles of community collaboration, crime management, professional accountability and employee wellness are being delivered.

Community leaders have a critical voice in these forums to say how their respective communities are served.

Divisions are presenting virtually during COVID-19.







CORRIDORS OF OPPORTUNITY

- Beatties Ford Rd./Rozzelles Ferry Corridor
- Central Avenue Corridor
- Freedom Drive/Wilkinson Blvd. Corridor
- North Graham/North Tryon Corridor
- West Blvd and Remount
- Sugar Creek/I85 Corridor



CORRIDORS OF OPPORTUNITY

- In the city's six Corridors of Opportunity, respective patrol divisions have had several hundred interactive patrols including walking beats, bike patrols, community roll calls.
- More than 1,700 arrests were made in the identified corridors of opportunity.
- Officers conducted more than 2,000 traffic stops, wrote roughly 300 citations, and issued more than 1,000 verbal warnings.
- JAG Grant overtime officers worked thousands of hours of overtime in 2020, most of the overtime activity involved high visibility patrols in addition to coordinating drug operations to reduce violent crime associated with the drug trade.
- Partnered with local business leaders, CPCRT and mental health groups to address homeless and mental health challenges.
